HIV in Mid-Michigan

Perceptions offers an HIV/AIDS Educational Workshop thru B.A.S.I.S. and Hearth Home on Thursday, April 28th at 7 pm at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Midland. This confidential presentation will focus on HIV/AIDS and how it is affecting our communities. Attendees will gain a local perspective and will have the opportunity to educate themselves, friends, peers, family and loved ones.

Did you know that one of the fastest growing populations for HIV infection is heterosexual women? Why knowing your status is important? If you test positive, what are the implications? What resources are available in this not-so-metropolitan part of Michigan? Are you prepared to help a friend who might test positive? Do you have the information to educate your friends, peers, family and loved ones about HIV and related resources?

America and our community are not talking about the AIDS epidemic anymore but it's certainly not over. In fact, there is a new resurgence, among young people especially, and turning this around begins with discussions across the dinner table, at your place of worship and throughout your

daily contacts. Let's begin to talk about this and create a safe space so those touched by HIV/AIDS can seek necessary resources, be comforted by a strong support system and are aware of the opportunities that exist within our very own community.

Rachel Crandall, executive director of TransGender Michigan, facilitated forty-two participants in a discussion about transgenderism/gender variant lives.

Rachel and other gender variant people - Julie, Rebecca and Carrie - eloquently and candidly shared slices of their lives: they "have been" female since early years; three had prior heterosexual relationships; one had corrective surgery 30 years ago; suicidal thoughts were common and real in the past and more.

After the discussion Rebecca expressed her life as "like being trapped in a building that is burning. You do what you need to be alive or you'll die." We are glad she is alive.

People just want to "be." Audience members acknowledged this after the meeting.

During the successful CMU Pride Week, many people and organizations took advantage of the programs CMU and LGBT affiliates had to offer. Pride Week also marked the birth of a sibling organization to Perceptions. Chad Grandy from The Community had this to say in our forum. He is our feature guest columnist this month.

Hello. My name is Chad Grandy and I am a member of the new LGBT organization, The Community. Our organization is fairly new, but our general purpose is to serve the Mid-Michigan LGBT community. We're focusing most on the Mt. Pleasant, Alma, Clare area. We are very new as I said before, only about 2 weeks old, but found the time to have our first event yesterday, our Exodus Demonstration.

We had about 60 people come out throughout the night. The event started at 6:00 pm with a picnic across the street from the Lutheran church which was hosting the Exodus speaker. Some people had signs, which were all very positive, and we had a lot of cars honk in support. The Exodus event within the church had about 50 members to whom we handed fliers out as they walked out with information such as, “The Truth About Exodus” and “Supportive organizations if you're questioning your sexuality or have been victimized because of it.”

As we stated in our press release, we did not want to protest Exodus, rather offer support to those who may have been forced to go to the event. It's very common for pastors to alert parents of these kinds of events and have their children who are struggling with their sexuality attend, sometimes by force. Our group was simply there to show that it is OK to be gay.

The night was very successful and we thank all of the organizations who participated and helped out in any way they could. It was a great way to start out our organization and we all look forward to having many more in the future.

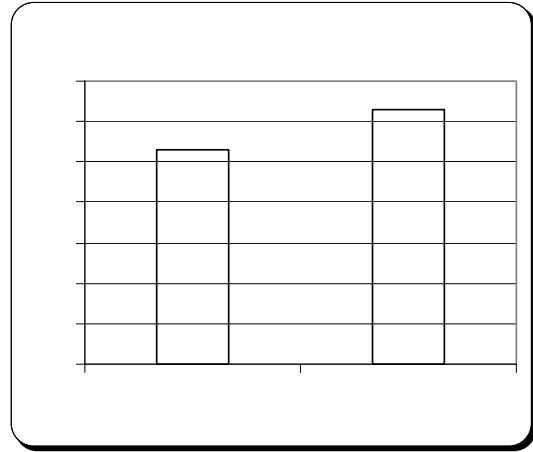
